Tiwahe has allowed our Tribe to build a holistic, family-centered approach that strengthens Native children and families through culturally grounded services, education, child welfare, youth programming, Tribal Court development, and wraparound support.

"Through our Puow'wan Program, Tiwahe funding has helped us move beyond fragmented services and create coordinated systems that support children, families, and future generations through culturally grounded, wraparound services. Tiwahe recognizes what Tribal Nations have always known, that strong children come from strong families, and strong families are built through the guidance of parents, grandparents, and elders. This investment empowers Tribes to strengthen family stability, preserve cultural identity, and improve outcomes for Native children while advancing tribal self-determination and sovereignty. Our experience has shown that when Tribes are trusted to design solutions rooted in their own values and traditions, families thrive.

"Congress must ensure that all ten Tiwahe Initiative Tribes remain fully included and fully funded. This investment is laying the groundwork for stronger families, healthier communities, and brighter futures for Native children while honoring the federal trust responsibility and supporting Tribal Nations in caring for their own people," **said the Paiute Indian Tribe of Utah.**

"Native children are the future of our Tribal Nations, and their health is a promise the United States is obligated to keep. The Native Children's Commission Implementation Act turns the recommendations of the Alyce Spotted Bear and Walter Soboleff Commission into action — expanding Tribal self-governance over behavioral health and nutrition, strengthening maternal and child health, and giving Tribes a direct voice in the federal decisions that shape our children's lives. The National Indian Health Board thanks Chair Murkowski and Vice Chair Schatz for their leadership, and we stand ready to help move this bill from introduction to law," **said A.C. The Red Lake Nation is aware of the profound significance of the Tiwahe Initiative. The Initiative has effectively decreased child out-of-home placements by 70%.

Over the past decade, we have leveraged this flexible funding model to develop programs that are rooted in our culture, and we have prioritized our children’s connection to community in our decision-making processes. The Initiative has provided financial support to families in reuniting, and through our child welfare intake, funds are allocated to address poverty rather than mistakenly perceiving families’ circumstances as a child welfare concern. The Red Lake Nation is committed to preserving and expanding the Tiwahe Initiative as a permanent program. We extend our sincere gratitude to Senator Lisa Murkowski for steadfast support of the Native Children’s Commission Bill, which incorporates the Tiwahe Initiative,” **said Darrell G.
